### **The Friends**

The Friends of South Australia's Archives Inc. was formed in 1996, its aim being to:

1. Encourage the preservation of historical records,
2. Assist the keepers of public and private archives in SA, and
3. Represent the concerns of users of archives.

Our membership includes archivists, historians and interested members of the general public. The organisation thus brings together the custodians and users of historical records. Over the twenty-five years of the Friend's history, we have had some success in lobbying for South Australian archives and access to historic records.

### **Fellowships**

The Friends in our 25<sup>th</sup> year, is pleased to announce the release of two small Fellowships of \$250 each per annum, named to recognize its former President, Jack Cross AM. The Fellowships will be awarded annually to small history projects or to support students of South Australian history, who are pursuing a dedicated program of historical research in archives and history, with a focus in the use of South Australian archival resources. Fellowships may be used for travel expenses to access records or put towards the photocopying or digitising of archival material. While the Friends are flexible as to how the Fellowship is used, the research focus must be on South Australia and its associated archival records. The recipients will be required to provide a short piece for the FSAA newsletter on their research project.
