The South Australian Church History Network is a group of historians from several Christian denominations (currently Anglican, Baptist, Salvation Army, Uniting Church) who are concerned with the recognition of SA religious history within the broader history of SA and within the religious history of Australia as a whole. Its aims are:

- to increase awareness of the Christian presence in and contribution to SA life and history from 1836.
- to critically explore the notion of SA as a 'Paradise of Dissent', which was distinctive within Australia.
- to document existing historical analysis of the role of Christianity and churches in SA and to encourage further research and publication.

In its beginnings, South Australia was borne on the full tide of reform. ... there was to be found, behind all the plans, the idealistic hope that the new colony would be a land free from political patronage and the evils of a privileged church.

...the real father of [South Australia's] religious liberties was George Fife Angas...[whose] great object was, in the first instance, to provide a place of refuge for pious dissenters of Great Britain, who could in their new home discharge their consciences before God in civil and religious duties without any disabilities.

At its coming of age Adelaide had fulfilled its founders' utopian dreams of civil and religious liberty. ... But what kind of society had emerged? ... The leading colonists had fought hard for the things they wanted, but when the struggle was over they seemed to have exhausted their enterprise and lost the ability to lead.

Adelaide was in danger of becoming like her neighbours.
