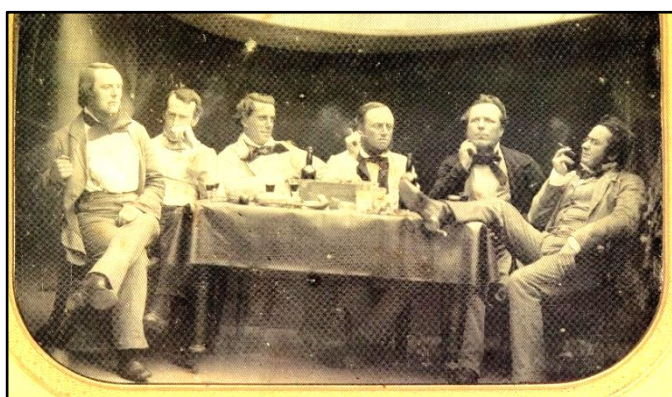

## THIS MONTH'S MEETING: Monday 16 September at 7.30pm

Our September meeting will feature Ian Sellick as our speaker. Ian's topic will be *Theatre Life in Colonial Adelaide, 1836 – 1856*. Full details of the speaker and his topic can be found in the meeting flyer on page 4 of this Bulletin.

The image below is a very early SA photograph taken around 1850 by an unknown photographer and depicts six men seated in a very casual manner around a table. It is simply entitled *Actors*. The six men are likely to all be amateur actors with the one second from right being identified as George Coppin who was known to be the "father of Australian theatre". Coppin was in Adelaide from 1846 until the end of 1851 during which time he was responsible for the opening of the New Queen's Theatre and the renovated Royal Victorian Theatre, he also performed as a comic actor. Our speaker will no doubt have some stories about actor Coppin.

## THREE HISTORIC BURNSIDE HOMES: Can you name them?



The BHS meeting on **Monday 21 October** will feature three of our own members, Dianne Wilson, Liz Silz and Bob Stace telling the stories of three historic Burnside homes; two remaining and one gone but not forgotten.

See if you can work out from the three images, to the left and below, the names of the three homes.



### THE 4 MISTRESSES OF BEAUMONT HOUSE

We were regaled with four of the costumes from the National Trust's Costume Collection when Sandy Whitelaw spoke at our August meeting. Sandy has been the curator of the Collection for over 7 years. The Collection has recently moved from Ayers House to Beaumont House. Keep an eye out for the next costume exhibition later this year which will feature a wedding theme.

Sandy spoke of the four mistresses (chatelaines) of Beaumont House during the period 1851-1967 who were represented by the models in the photo to the left.

From the left, the first mistress was Millicent Short who was the wife of Augustus Short, the first Anglican Bishop of Adelaide. The Shorts moved into Beaumont House in 1851 but left in 1856 to live in their newly built residence Bishop's Court next to Christ Church in North Adelaide.

The second mistress (2<sup>nd</sup> from left) was Lady Margaret Davenport wife of Sir Samuel Davenport. The Davenports had a lengthy stay in Beaumont House until Lady Margaret's death in 1902 and then her husband in 1906. Lady Davenport was a philanthropist who took a great interest in benevolent institutions, particularly the servants' home and the State Children's Department.

In 1907 the House was purchased by Major William Vincent and his wife Alice (nee Buzzard). Alice is represented by our speaker Sandy Whitelaw (third from the left). During their short stay until 1911 Alice, a socialite, and her husband made extensive alterations to the House.

In 1911 Beaumont House was taken over by lawyer Richard Bennett and his bohemian wife Lilian Brocksopp (portrayed in the photo by Rosie Olbryt). Richard Bennett died in 1929, and Lilian married Kenneth Brock in 1936. She bequeathed Beaumont House to the National Trust of South Australia in 1968. The property was listed on the South Australian heritage register in 1980.

Sandy stressed throughout her talk that at a time when women were very much second class citizens, these four women did not stand in the shadows of their husband but beside them and were interesting in their own right. They played a key part in the running of the House and in so doing made it possible for their husbands to achieve.

Sandy's story of the four chatelaines and her use of the costumes was much enjoyed by the 43 members and visitors who braved the thunder, lightning and rain during the night.

## **NEWS OF THE BHS ORAL HISTORY PROJECT**

Also attending our August meeting was Karen Muller (on the left in the photo) who was the City of Burnside's Historical and Cultural Officer last year when Michelle Toft was on parenting leave. Karen provided an update on the BHS Oral History Project which commenced in 1988, with phase 2 achieved in 1997. Under Karen's leadership the recordings have now been digitized and are available on the computer in the Local History Room of the Burnside Library. A printed transcript is also available, which makes this important historical collection much more accessible to researchers.

It was also great to welcome Michelle Toft (centre) and Hannah Shaw (right), the current Historical and Cultural Officers who were present to "support" Karen.



If you have not visited the Local History Room lately (or ever!), then why not call in on any Monday afternoon from 1.30-4.30pm when Michelle or Hannah, with the support of volunteers, will be there to answer your questions or show you around. It is a most valuable and interesting collection.

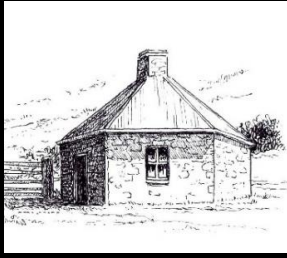
## **EASTERN REGION HISTORY SEMINAR**

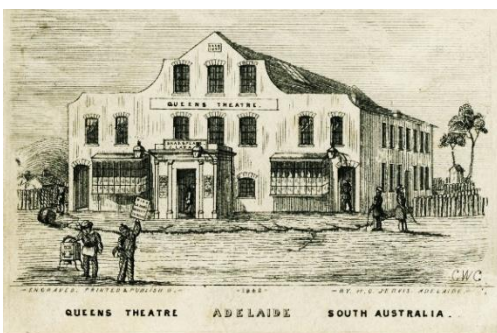
### *Theatre Life in Colonial Adelaide* **1836 -1856**

#### **The Speaker: Ian Sellick**

Ian is a retired self-employed electrical contractor whose interest in Adelaide's colonial history has led to the publication of three books *Chasing Ancient Sea Shores*, detailing the history of Australia's inland sea, *Early Theatre Life in Adelaide SA, 1836-56*, which provides the content of this talk and recently *Charles Hill, Colonial Painter, 1824-1915*.



**The Topic:** Ian's talk will detail the story of the first 13 theatres opened in Adelaide between 1836 and 1856. He will provide information on the colourful proprietors and actors of these times and give an insight into the entertainment enjoyed by early colonists. His talk will be interwoven with stories of crime and daily life in Adelaide at the time that impinged on the entertainment of the theatre goers .
